About CitizenDetroit

Founded in 2012 by Dr. Irvin D. Reid and Sheila Cockrel, CitizenDetroit (CD) is a voter education initiative housed at Wayne State University. CD held five public Dinner & Dialogue sessions from February to June 2016 with a total of 467 participants including public officials and staff. Seated by council district, participants were asked to discuss and vote (individually and by table consensus) on their top five qualifications for DPS Superintendent and School Board members. Pre- and post-event clicker polls were conducted to gather information about attendee characteristics and opinions about Detroit's public education system. The Feb 11 and March 3 program included expert presentations on the history, finances, academics, and overall landscape of public education in Detroit. The remaining three events featured a boardgame exercise showcasing DPS history and current facts.

Executive Summary

Background

Since 2012, CitizenDetroit has convened high performing voter residents to present information about municipal finance, the city budget, city services, and Detroit's Chapter 9 bankruptcy. Education and the state of Detroit Public Schools has come up repeatedly as a subject participants desired to learn more about and discuss with CitizenDetroit.

With the worsening DPS financial crisis, teacher sickouts, possible end to state emergency management and return to an elected School Board, as well as major proposals from the Mayor, Governor, local leaders, and the state legislature, CitizenDetroit recognized a key opportunity to convene Detroit residents on a vital issue that would require informed electoral engagement. This report summarizes the events and the characteristics, preferences and attitudes of the participants regarding Detroit public education.



















1. What is the top challenge facing Detroit Public Schools? (n=307)




Opinions on DPS (2/11 & 3/3 combined clicker results)

2. The new DPS Superintendent's top priority should be... (n=303)




3. The new DPS School Board should be... (n=315)

5. What is your opinion on the recent teacher sickouts? (n=310)




Table Exercises

At each event, facilitators led participants in a discussion and vote on selection criteria for DPS Superintendent and DPS School Board members. Seated by council district in small groups, participants used dot stickers to cast votes for their top five criteria for each position.
